2. Call to Order
3. Approval of Agenda
Ken moved to approve the agenda, Ron seconded. Motion passed.
4. Approval of May minutes
Ken moved to approve the May minutes as submitted. Jim seconded. Motion passed.
5. Acceptance of Reports
 - a. Treasurer
Ken mentioned that he has worked with the Endowment Committee to finalize quarterly payments of \$5000 from the Endowment to the general fund.

Ken recommends terminating our copier lease and purchasing a laser printer/copier (see treasurer's report after minutes). He feels this would save a lot of money and we do not need the number of copies that would be required to justify the expense of the copier rental. Katrina suggested that if we did need a mass printing, we could get that printed by a printing company. **Jim moved that we adopt Ken's plan to cancel the current Ricoh printer lease and to purchase a color office laser printer. Susie seconded. Motion passed.**

6. Old Business

Ken reported that Yoga rental will begin on June 17 at 6 PM as long as Elkhart County is

in yellow or blue.

Amy mentioned that for the 4th of July, she would like to see members arrive at UUFE with carry-in lunches at 11 AM, outside with the Gathering Place as a cooling place with masks required inside. Hopefully, we can begin in-person worship with masks at the end of August or beginning of September with the capability to have meetings available on the web as well.

Katrina asked Amy if she needed board assistance or input at this time to move forward with hybrid services. Amy responded that the Worship and Arts Committee is on board with this. She stated that the committee did come up with an idea to hire an individual to advise or run the technical aspect of this. She said that she has been working with Carl and Dwight and that she knows what equipment and software we need.

b. Proposal for online directory

Terry stated that a page has been created without a link - url needed - and is password protected. He thought that we would share the password with members. Katrina shared the concern that we make clear that the page and password is for members only and is not to be shared with others. Terry stated that the directory is in .pdf format, which eliminates the problem of the emails being harvested from the page.

c. Proposal for Parking Lot Repair and Expansion

Katrina asked Mike if he had heard back from any of the companies regarding estimates. Mike stated that we do not have any estimates back yet. We have requests out to Reith-Riley and Ancon.

7. New Business

We have no volunteers at this time to represent UUFE at GA. Amy mentioned that she would be doing Ministry days prior to GA.

8. Volunteer of the Month

Oxana Werbianski, Annette Long, Laura Snow, Amy DeBeck and all who were involved in the Welcome to (Your UUFE) Home event were named volunteers of the month.

9. Closing

a. Next meeting July 14, 6pm at UUFE.

Jim brought up that one suggestion for dealing with the extreme financial and membership situation is to move the minister to half-time or to move to lay ministry. Discussion ensued. Carl stated that if there are concerns, the issue needs to be put on the agenda and the new board needs to address this issue. Pam mentioned that we need to be doing some background work on board and congregational understanding of proper procedures to air grievances and to resolve issues.

Reports

Treasurer’s Report May 2021 (Reported at Board Meeting June 9, 2021)

1. I have attached the “Income and Expense” and the “Cash Flow” reports for May. We showed a net income of negative \$4304 for the month but \$4,122 of that deficit could be considered extraordinary. We paid \$1695 as our final quarter payment to UUA. We will remain an Honor Congregation again this year, a struggle to say the least, but given the fact that UUA granted us money to repair the basement we feel this is appropriate. In addition, we brought ourselves up to date through year end for our Mortgage payback to the Endowment of \$2426.00 (we had been behind due to a problem processing deposits to Vanguard, which Jim Barnes resolved). This will make a clean break at “year-end” so that we can take a one-year hiatus from the monthly payments for the next budget year as agreed upon at the Annual Meeting discussion of the Budget. This means that the final payback month for the Mortgage will be April 2026.
2. We still have not heard from TCF bank about our PPP loan forgiveness. It should be noted that the Small Business Administration (SBA) has three months to issue its answer and we did not have access to the Banking Portal to submit the paperwork until April 29th so, technically, the SBA has until the end of July to give us a reply.
3. Even though we are still tied to TCF bank because of the PPP loan we intend to make our move to Centier Bank as soon as possible. T.J Shaum (assistant Treasurer for Disbursements), Steve Cripe (assistant Treasurer for Deposits) and I will meet with officers of Centier Bank on the morning of Friday June 11, 2021, to discuss the next steps.
4. As part of the effort to help save money in the future we have allowed our copier lease to lapse so that we can purchase a copier/printer/scanner/fax of our own. We have not settled on one yet but even if we purchase a top-notch Laser Jet and spend \$500.00 on a unit, we could see a return on that investment in less than four months, since we have been paying \$161.00 a month for the RICOH lease. RICOH is making it awfully difficult to return the unit.
5. Some news about upcoming expenses. On July 1st we will need to pay our semi-annual payment to Church Mutual Insurance for our new building insurance policy. This will be about \$1,500.00. In addition, UUA has raised the health insurance by 10%, which was included in the projected budget for next year.

THE BACKGROUND EXPERIENCES

In 2008, in July, my family and I moved to Elkhart, IN. My tenure with UUFE was to begin on August 1. On July 27 a man walked into our Knoxville TN UU church and began shooting, during a Sunday morning youth-led program. He was restrained and disarmed, after he killed 2 adults and wounded 6 others. 2 days before I was scheduled to be on the clock, UUFE hosted a vigil and we made peace flags to send to the re-consecration of the Tennessee church.

On November 22, 2009, I led a worship service about gratitude. People had been given Hershey Kisses upon entry into the service and asked to hand them out to whomever they chose in a Communion/sharing time. After the service, a newcomer/frequent visitor whose child was involved with our RE program stood in the entry foyer expressing wishes to shoot up or “firebomb” the place for blaspheming the word “Communion.” Ken and I spoke with him and he apologized. He also ceased attending.

Throughout 2012, 2013, until the fall of 2014, we had a series of highly fraught interactions with a friend of the church, L, who was partnered with a beloved member, R. During different periods of time within those years, I was in close contact with many professionals, including the Elkhart Police and Sheriff's Department because L had a habit of calling my phone and threatening me. She said in the recordings and in person that she had a license to carry. Not a direct threat, but intimidation nonetheless. I saved the recordings, presented them to police and discerned whether I needed a restraining order and whether or not the church needed for me to take out a No Trespass Order. Before a decision could get made, L died. I have not found it in the minutes but I know that I brought up a gun policy during this time at a board meeting. (By the end of the conversation it was delegated to the Worship arena to handle; we did a service with a fire drill.)

January 2014 a shooting happened at the Elkhart Martins many of us shop. Half a dozen or so went to the vigil at Martins and went back to my house for debriefing.

In 2016 I met L, who was the former nurse of C, a longtime member. C had shown up at a worship service after the congregation had not seen him in a long time. During the absence C had declined in physical health and had harmed another congregant during a mental health crisis. We were all surprised when C disrupted the worship service to announce that he was back and brought his fiancé. We had eulogized his wife a few years before. In getting to know the fiancé, many things came to light not for sharing. But my relational time with her ended when she threatened me and others while having coffee in a Martin's Deli. She made her threat, then patted her purse, telling me she is “always packing.” The children of C got custody of C to stop the marriage and not long after, C died. I have no information about L.

In the fall of 2017 I had a meeting at UUFE with a local police officer about how to prepare UUFE for a live active shooter, with a drill. He said that, statistically, we would be more likely

to have an emergency regarding a medical event from one of our congregants. We ran a drill that involved a congregant (played by a teen) slumping in their chair and all of us making room for the EMT's to come through the area. This is alluded to in the Board Minutes of December 2017.

THE QUESTION

Now we have had the events of May 22 when a man wore a gun on his belt for the whole time he was on our campus. While he was outside, I asked him if he had a weapon on his hip. He said that he carries a gun openly even though he has a concealed license, because he is one of the good guys. I inferred this meant he was ready to pull it out and use it any time. I wanted to ask him to go put it back in his van and not carry it through our sacred space. I looked around at the UUFE folks within hearing and sight range and decided not to say a word. **Why?**

I was not sure if I would receive backup, or if a debate would start about gun safety and gun rights. I could imagine both, in that flash of a second. Do we have consensus on guns at our church or is it something we need to discuss?

Of all these times that I have personally felt threatened while working in the position of minister, I have never known the truth on how UUFE feels about guns. No policy has been proposed nor written. The times that I have (weakly, not directly) mentioned an anti-gun policy it has been met with suggestions other than a policy and /or signage. It has happened so frequently that, on May 22, faced with a gun, I did not feel safe, and that is a problem.

Also as a leader, I was not able to keep my people as safe as I could.

So, I propose that we begin the task of writing and passing a gun policy for UUFE, however that looks.

OLD BUSINESS

1. Directory status

We spent our time concentrating on the printed version of the directory.

a. Corrections

Mike recently sent a copy of the directory that had been updated after additions and corrections made at the “Visiting Home” event. Joan and Annette suggested some more updates and revisions.

The committee decided that adult children should no longer be listed under their parent’s entry. Therefore, the following names will be removed: Ellie Berry, Cyril Cherniak, Maya King-Meade, and Arispa Weigold.

b. Photos – color or black and white

The quote from Printers Plus showed that directories with photos in color would cost \$3.85 each while ones with black and white photos would be \$2.02 each. The committee decided to go with the less expensive black and white option. Printers Plus indicated that there would not be a price-break unless they printed 200 or 250 copies.

c. Quantity

Mike sent Joan a final print-ready e-copy of the directory which Joan emailed to Printers Plus while she was at the store. She got confirmation that they received it and was told it looked good. There are 107 “households” listed, and the committee told Joan to go ahead and decide how many to print. She decided 120 for a total cost of \$242.40. If we need a few more printed later the increase in price might be about \$0.50 per copy.

d. Cover color and timing

Continuing with the ROYGBV (Red, Orange, Yellow, Green, Blue, Violet) color rotation for the cover, Joan chose “Cosmic Orange” for this year’s cover color. (The last directory color was “Rocket Red.”)

The directories are ordered and should be available within 7 to 10 business days. (June 11th to the 16th.)

e. Distribution activities

Since we don’t know when we will be meeting in person at UUFE, most of the directories will need to be mailed. This means there will have to be 3 stickers attached to the open sides of the booklet, labels will need to be printed (Ken said he would do this) and attached, and postage / stamps will need to be figured out. Linda said she would check with the post office on this.

2. Visiting Home event May 22nd

a. The Good News

We had a wonderful turnout for the 3-hour event at UUFE. Over 50 people attended and seemed to thoroughly enjoy visiting with one another, going in the sanctuary,

looking at the basement improvements (RE, nursery, and CUUPS rooms) and just generally being able to socialize. We sure have missed each other.

In addition, several new people stopped by and asked to be in the directory. Lee Burdorf lives across the street and has participated in several other outdoor UUFE activities, and Bethany McGill along with Geo Warner have been watching the online services. Yay!

b. The Bad News

One man, John, who had been familiar with UUFE many years ago came carrying a gun!! Several people noticed it, but many did not. Rev. Amy asked him about it, and he said he had a license to carry a concealed weapon, but he didn't conceal it because he was a "good guy." Well, that being said, many of us were very disturbed by this. UUFE has a Disruptive Behavior Policy, but it does not specify anything about weapons. Perhaps it should.

NEW BUSINESS

1. Some member updates

Norann Winn – Linda and Joan have talked to Norann recently. She was in the hospital a couple of weeks ago and is in complete renal failure. She told Joan she will need to have 8 hours of dialysis every day. She shared with Linda that her family is giving her help and support. Rev. Amy said she has been in contact with her.

Joan Grimes – Linda talked with Joan about euchre club and found that she had been hospitalized with a couple mini strokes. She is currently home, upbeat, and ready to participate in euchre. Rev. Amy will reach out to her.

The Endowment Committee met at Uufe on Sunday, June 6, 2021. The value of the Endowment is at \$649,297.61, up from \$636,581.19 on April 1st. This is in spite of \$14,000 having been moved out of the Endowment Fund into the Uufe bank account during that time. For the year, we are up 6.9%. Uufe holdings currently have 91% stocks and the stock market is near all-time highs. There was some discussion of moving some of the funds in equities to safer investments such as bonds, but no changes to our investments were made at this time.
